Colombian Conflict (1964 -)

The Colombian conflict is really a set of conflicts and the peace agreements reflect both different processes relating to different conflict groups and dyads, and processes taking place at different times in a complex peace process history. The Colombian civil war has its roots in the late 1940s and the violent infighting between liberal and the conservative factions. Emerging from the liberal tradition with a thorough grounding in nationalist communist ideology, the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia—People's Army (FARC) began its armed insurrection against the Colombian government in 1964. Other left-wing guerrillas emerged as well, most notably the socialist/populist M-19, which would later be integrated into the formal political system in the peace process of 1990s; the National Liberation Army (ELN), which has strong roots in liberation theology, and the Maoist Ejército Popular de Liberación (EPL) (also part of the 1990 process, less successfully). Several stages of peace processes were undertaken by the various sides, which were further complicated by the emergence of right-wing paramilitary 'selfdefence' forces. The peace agreement between the Colombian government under President Uribe and the main alliance of the paramilitary groups, the United Self-Defence Forces of Colombia (AUC), concluded in 2005 and is still heavily disputed as several remnants are still active, but now subsumed under the heading 'Bacrim' (Bandas criminales). In addition, FARC and ELN maintain a military presence, but both demonstrate a strong interest in completing successful peace negotiations with the government, with the most recent agreements being between FARC and the Government.

Description

This agreement is an ancillary to the "Agreement on a Temporary Bilateral National Ceasefire" between the Government of the Republic of Colombia and the ELN. It delineates procedures to avert incidents during the ceasefire. Instituted on 9 June 2023, and further detailed in Havana, Cuba, on 13 July 2023, this protocol specifies communication protocols between ELN fronts and the Monitoring and Verification Mechanism, facilitated by the United Nations Verification Mission in Colombia and the Episcopal Conference of Colombia, to ensure ELN's security measures and prevent armed confrontations. The protocol establishes secure communication channels for ELN to relay defense and security actions, appoints ELN liaisons for coordination with the Monitoring and Verification Mechanism, and outlines the responsibilities of government representatives in the mechanism to coordinate with military and police units to prevent incidents. This document is part of a broader effort to maintain ceasefire conditions and foster an environment conducive to ongoing peace negotiations, with signatories from both the Colombian government and the ELN, as well as observer status for representatives of the armed forces and guarantor countries.

Using the communications liaisons of the war fronts, ELN shall inform the Monitoring and Verification Mechanism through the components of the United Nations Verification Mission in Colombia and the Episcopal Conference of Colombia in a timely and relevant manner of its actions, activities, or movements on the ground that are aimed at ensuring its defense and security in order to prevent incidents and to prevent, forestall, or mitigate risks or any type of vulnerability in the places where ELN is present.
- 3. ELN shall use its own communication channels to transmit information concerning the above-mentioned points in an appropriate and timely manner to the ELN component of the national body of the Monitoring and Verification Mechanism, as well as to the relevant regional or local bodies through the components of the United Nations Verification Mission in Colombia and the Episcopal Conference of Colombia.
- 4. Through each war front, ELN shall establish with the components of the United Nations Verification Mission in Colombia and the Episcopal Conference of Colombia the ELN communications liaisons in the local and regional bodies of the Monitoring and Verification Mechanism.

In order to prevent incidents, the secure system used by the ELN component to communicate with all bodies of the Monitoring and Verification Mechanism shall be established by ELN in agreement with the United Nations Verification Mission in Colombia and the Episcopal Conference of Colombia.

The national body of the Monitoring and Verification Mechanism shall arrange for the security of the ELN communications liaisons who are members of the Mechanism.

5. The ELN component in the national body shall maintain its system for secure communication with all regional and local ELN communications liaisons.
