This was probably the dark side of this conference. Both UNWWA and PACT share the blamel. Delegates were hurried to Loki and to site without adequate preparation. It was worse for Lou citizen who had to walk for hours or even days to the conference venue only to have to fend for themselves before food supplies could be had.

Signs of poor coordination began in Nairobi on Saturday, July 2<sup>nd</sup>, the date of departure for the Nairobi contingent to Loki. The East African flight was delayed due to the large number of delegates who had not shown up at the prescribed time. It is easy to assume that this happened because people are un-enlightened about the norms of air travel. It is quite plausible that getting to the airport was taken for granted and no plans were made.<sup>33</sup>

We had been told in Nairobi that we would spend the night in Loki, take off for Yuai the following morning, and begin the four-day (maximum) conference on Monday, 4th July Sunday and Monday came and passed without incident. Finally, on the morning of July 5th we were trucked to New Site from where we would fly to Yuai. That was the only event that took place as amounced the previous night. We would try to keep a tight schedule and get the conference done by Saturday so as to leave on Sunday, July 10th. There were those who had to truly earn their living, with commitments!

Arriving in Yuai—the first heavy bomb was dropped! Signs of advanced logistics evaporated. Although we had arrived towards mid-day, we did not have our first meal till late evening! Why this was so is an issue that only UNWWA and PACT might care to explain. Our last days in Yuai would have been extremely miserable, were it not for the generosity of the people of Yuai making donations of meat.

In spite of an advance team and a general awareness that a big event had come to Yuai, not a single item of the agenda was carried out in time. Although we were anxious to begin the conference that Tuesday afternoon, nothing of significance took place transparently until Thursday, July  $7^{\rm th}$ .

A significantly redeeming factor in the Yuai conference, was the enthusiasm of participants of all walks to give their solving their problems a try. Evidence of this cuthusiasm abound:

- Delegates travelling from home and back on foot.
   Mastery of the disturbing issues.
- Delegates travelling from nome and to have a formed with the start of the disturbing issues.

  Anxiety for a lasting peace between forces, neighbours, clans, etc. Enduring difficulties of poor logistics without bitterness, and The UNWWA director herself visibly undergoing intense challenges.

Loki says Nairob has arranged to for transport at Jonn Censytata International. Never have 1 ever found a taxi booked by PACT waiting for me at the airport. I am either a minnow, or those who should make these arrangements are too big for the job.

We had expected to leave by Sunday or Monday, July 11, at the latest! There was no definitive feedback from Loki, nor from Nairobi! In fact, although there was a PACT representative on the ground in the person of Mr. Simon Gatluak, that did not translate into a significant advantage. Nairobi expected calls from Yuai even though the limited credit availed was exhausted!

With the heavy rains that generally begin to intensify in July, we were now left to fate—dangling between the availability of a plane, and a dry spell to permit craft to land. The logisticians, some of whom are certainly fly-by-night professionals limited their search for aircraft to NPA and Trackmark—hardly aware that there were other NGOs crisscrossing South Sudan. 34

On July 14, we were finally able to pack into a small craft, carrying over 25 persons, but only had two seats—which were embarrassingly contested without escalation, thanks to the fresh memories of the just-ended peace and reconciliation conference. We landed at New Site in the early afternoon and expected to find our transportation waiting. Mr. Stephen Goi, the UNWWA logistician, on being contacted by phone, informed the naxious arrivals—some of whom were anxious to connect to Nairobi—that vehicles were on the way, he himself was in one, and the second vehicle was far behind. Mr. Goi arrived more than one hour later, too late for the vehicle he came in, to drop its passengers in Loki and return for the rest. He assured those left behind that he second vehicle was somewhere between Loki and Narus on its way. This turned out to be an absolute lie. No vehicle showed up. In fact, no second vehicle had left Loki whatsoever. The PACT staff in Loki stated that their vehicles were doing other office assignments in Loki—as if delivering us safely to Loki was not a concern PACT! It dawned on us that there were no cooperative relations between the Loki UNWWA point man and his PACT counterparts.

Incredibly, we spent the night at the New Site airstrip—in relative comfort, thanks to the SPLA soldiers guarding the airstrip. They shared their meals with us and even offered us their own beds! May the dividends of peace trickle down, nay, be showered upon them!

Late the following morning, the same vehicle and driver of the previous day returned to fetch us. We obtained credible information that no agreement had been signed with ghost second vehicle. Late that afternoon (July 15) we called for a meeting between representatives of the Nairobi delegation who camped at New Site, UNWWA logistician and the PACT office manager before our departure for Nairobi where we did not want to file complaints based on suspicion. Mr. Got disappeared by returning to New Site and left us without answers as to how logistics bungled up even on arranging transportation from New Site. The newly deployed PACT Loxi office manager had no satisfactory answers other than to regurgitate the difficulty of finding available planes. As for not sending a PACT vehicle, his response was that it was doing office work and could not go to Loxi without the OK of Nairobi logisticians. I almost threw up! These were events played out

in terms of hours and days, not minutes! On our outward journey a PACT vehicle took a group to New Site; how could PACT play ostrich now?

On the brighter side, all delegates, especially from other counties in Lou area, were extremely tolerant and endured difficulties that were not of their making. It is not in my terms of reference to delve into the reasons for these difficulties. During conference sessions, one could hardly notice that some had not had their lunch or tea.

Rev. James Kuong Ninrew, the Co-Facilitator, doubled up as an able translator—a trying task demanding constant attention and staying on one's feet for hours at a time. The services of Mr. Radio Yuai (Gr. Simon Luk) were anxiously awaited and served as a refresher after long hours of references to murders and kidnappings!

Yuai seems to have a past reputation that it is still carrying. The reception we received, and the observations we made of SPLA, SPDF, and SSLM commanders moving about freely and sharing views convinced doubting Thomases that Yuai was finally at peach with itself and should be entitled to the relief activities that communities south of Louland seem to enjoy. In spite of all these perceptions, the friendliness and generosity of the people in Yuai are classically African. When food ran out, their offerings of beef and goat did not!
